As President of Region 5, this news **puts me in a bit of a panic** and so now I turn to you for **help**.

In order for us to keep our region association alive, and thus keep us eligible for our liability insurance, we need a new volunteer to be the treasurer.

To put my mind at ease, please contact me quickly if you would consider taking on this role or if you know of someone who might be persuaded to do so.

Bill is willing to help the new person to learn the ins and outs of the position and will make himself available.

The job requires someone with computer abilities as far as emailing documents and forms is concerned and because of the large distances between our clubs, our communications are done by email.

Late September to early December the treasurer contacts the region clubs with the information they need to collect fees. The treasurer receives the fees, makes bank deposits, fills in the appropriate forms (available on the Federation website) and sends a cheque to the BC Federation Treasurer.

At season end, the treasurer prepares financial statements for availability at the Region 5 AGM in May.

In between time, there is little to do except maintaining the financial books and processing the odd late registration.

We can't keep our Region going without extra support from dancers and/or leaders.

Somewhere in our Region I hope there is a person willing to help us out in this area. Please let me know quickly.


We look forward to future dances and festivals and hope to see many of you at the National Festival 2018 in London, Ontario this summer.


Tina and John Derksen are currently visiting Australia on a long-anticipated trip to see their son and his family, whom they haven't seen for 13 years!

'Live Lively...Square Dance'...ask about getting stickers for your vehicle.



Editor's Note: As Williams Lake caller, **Nick Turne**r will be celebrating 40 years of calling for the Stampede Whirlaways in May, I asked him to reflect on how he got started.

THEM WAS THE GOOD OL' DAYS or My Start as a Caller

In the early 1970s, I was invited to join a small group of people who square danced once a week in the basement of a local rancher's house a few miles west of Alexis Creek. I'd never heard of Square Dancing but was game to give it a try.

We danced to singing call records played on a turntable with no speed control so we always danced singers like bats out of hell.

I learned to dance 'Tiny Bubbles', 'Pussy Cat', 'Rosabella', 'Houston' and 'Mighty Joe' from among the small collection of records. There was no Round Dancing.

The group grew bigger and we started to travel around the area to dance in other people's houses. In the living room of one, we tried to dance a song called 'Down In Old Mexico' but the called side was so scratched up, we could not make out the calls. The music side of the record was pristine so I volunteered to try calling the song - no microphone, no amplifier and of course, no experience and no practice and that was my start as a "caller."

Back in 'them good old days' of forty and more years ago, all Square Dance music was recorded on 45 rpm vinyl records. On one side was a caller doing the patter or singer and on the reverse side was just the music.

To hear new releases, callers joined a Square Dance record review service and each month received a cassette tape with samples of all the new music from the past month. They could then listen to 25 -30 new releases each month and order what they liked, pay by credit card - number already held by the record service (no hacking in the days) - and the records would be mailed to them sandwiched between two square pieces of cardboard - often held up at customs - and so a week or more after ordering they received their new music.

Times change and now callers can order directly from the music producers' websites with a click of the mouse, receive the MP3 download usually in minutes, upload it to their laptop and be practising the song. They can listen to new releases, find any song available on a website, pay by PayPal and 'Bob's your uncle.'

The music review service sold out to a new owner a few years ago who quickly dumped 200,000 vinyl records from the inventory in the trash.

The 45 rpm vinyl is a thing of the past and after a brief fling with CDs, and mini discs most callers today are fully digital.

If anyone is interested, I have all the cassette tapes and the notes from the vinyl years. Free for the asking! (You pay shipping.)

Square Dancing "Gifts" by Bill Cave

What have we got in the boxes?

When a square dance club puts on a jamboree they are, in effect, giving a gift to the dancers of the other clubs who choose to attend. It's just not wrapped up in boxes with ribbons and bows.



All the time and effort club members

voluntarily put in to preparing for such an event demonstrates their willingness to undertake this labour of love.

The only thing required in return is the participation and enjoyment of the dancers who attend. I have yet to attend a jamboree at any club which didn't leave me feeling like I wanted more of the same; dancing, laughing, spirited conversation and lots of fun.

The Williams Lake Stampede Whirlaways are currently planning and preparing for their 60th Anniversary to be held on May 25th to 27th. During the Jamboree weekend a number of landmarks will be celebrated including **Nick Turner's** 40th Anniversary of square dance calling for the Whirlaways.

The weekend, as always, will be an event to behold: "*The Greatest Show on Earth*" a circus theme. As always, the club members have been hard at work preparing decorations and putting in hours of practice for their roles. Bring your costume, join in and prepare to be amazed!

If you want to find out what's in the boxes and experience all the other surprises that have been prepared for your enjoyment, please plan to attend.

We Don't Make Changes Anymore. by Nick Turner

In fact there are a lot of things we don't do anymore in our own Region 5 Square Dance world.

It's true that many hands make light work and square dancers throughout our region generally make a great team. Next season, try to be a part of this team. It'll make you feel good and your help will be most appreciated.


That's a Wrap for This Season !
