
(A Note from the Editors)







GENERAL INFORMATION

Region 5 has 5 active clubs, and approximately 120 members

Our clubs do not interact as much as we would like to because of the large geographical area Region 5 covers. We do keep in contact through Email bulletins sent out by region president, **Mary Anne Turner**, and the Cariboo Connection Newsletter that is published 3 times a year by **Nick and Mary Anne Turner**. It contains whatever news the clubs in our area wish to contribute. Hard copies are delivered to our clubs and the Newsletters are also posted on our Region 5 website at **www.r5ccda.squaredance.bc.ca**

Region 5 continues to experience the same difficulties as many of the other regions. We have clubs that have folded, few new callers committed to becoming club callers and a great need for more dancers. We have approximately 120 dancers in the Region this season.


