A Stressful Summer

For many of the dancers in Region 5, this past summer was one filled with wildfire alerts, evacuations, property losses and many, many smokey days.

Dancers in the southern and central parts of our region spent much of the summer on alert, packed and ready to go at short notice. Day after day they gazed at horizons through smokey skies looking for approaching flames and watching helicopters with water buckets flying overhead.


100 Mile House, Williams Lake and surrounding areas were finally given the order to leave. For Williams Lake, most of them went southeast to Kamloops not knowing what awaited in terms of accommodation as they had planned to head north - but fire blocked the road when the Order came. This resulted in a trip of fourteen and more hours, bumper to bumper through the night, down Highway 24 to Little Fort and on to Kamloops as 12,000 evacuated Williams Lake.

Many of them were away from their homes for three weeks or more before being allowed to return. Some took an unscheduled holiday and took their RVs east to Alberta and elsewhere not knowing if they would have a home or a pile of ash to come home to. Many billeted with family, friends, or even with complete strangers.

It was a discouraging summer and there are so many stories to relate but thankfully no tragedies. As far as we know, none of our dancers lost their homes to the huge wildfires devouring the Cariboo, although some of our non-dancing friends were not as lucky.

In the northern part of our region, Prince George dancers rallied magnificently to offer places to stay or a back yard to park. Many served as volunteers in shelters and Evacuation centres.

Outside our region, square dancers sent messages of concern and offers of help via email and Facebook. Square dancers are indeed a family. We thank you sincerely for your friendship and service.

A Unique Evacuation Adventure

Like hundreds of other people I was evacuated during the wildfire season this past summer. My sister Susan, (who was on holiday from England) and I were on vacation in Wells, B.C. On the day we were due to leave the roads were closed. Later we heard people were coming north from Williams Lake, so I presumed we could travel south. However, there was a road block at McAllister and we were turned back and told to go to Quesnel or Prince George. Instead we chose to return to Wells and the Hubs Motel where we remained for the duration of the evacuation period.

Every day we drove into Barkerville where we always found plenty to occupy us during those three weeks. While exploring the town we became well acquainted with the various street musicians, actors, staff at the front desks and those working in the stores as well as the ones who took part twice a day in the theatre shows.

We were the only evacuees at the time and were spoilt by everyone - which, of course, we enjoyed. At C. Strouss I was handed a free coffee each morning, and other Barkerville staff treated us to supper occasionally and sometimes even a glass of wine! One afternoon we were ushered into the theatre free of charge, and the owners of the Saloon offered us the use of their house in Quesnel if, for any reason, we had to leave Wells. The owners of The Hubs Motel were extremely kind and supportive during our stay, even going as far as to pick up our medication in Quesnel. The lady who ran one of the bed and breakfast hotels invited us for afternoon tea. Later she gave us a tour of the beautifully furnished house as it would have been in the late 1800's - early 1900's. Another time the blacksmith surprised us with a handsome gift each of a piece of ironwork we had been watching him create in the forge.

Although Barkerville was not as crowded as usual nor the stores as busy, visitors still walked the main

street, taking in the historical enactments and entertainment offered on and off all day. Several rode the horse-drawn wagon to the Richfield Courthouse - including Susan and I, to watch the re-enactment of a murder trial that had occurred during the town's early days, while others took a turn around the settlement in a stagecoach.

However, the numbers were far below the usual and entertainers found themselves playing to scant audiences at times, but never-the-less the shows still went on. Cemetery and town tours were on offer every day, and services were held at regular times in St. Saviour's Church.

As much as we were able, Susan and I helped advertise the fact that, in spite of the fires, the historic town of Barkerville was open for business as usual. We appeared on their website as well as on the radio, although unfortunately we were listed as being from Clinton instead of Williams Lake.

On our last day of evacuation we dressed in period costume - courtesy of L.A. Blanc Photography Gallery. We paraded up and down the main street in long frocks, cute old-fashioned boots and hats decorated with flowers, feathers and ribbons. As we watched the last afternoon street show of the day, given by the musicians, we were pulled out of the audience to join in the final performance of the "Rattling Bog" action song - a song we had finally learned after three weeks of trying! We were then presented with a certificate each of Honorary Citizenship and were told we were now official "Barkervillians"! We were also adopted into the Barkerville 'Family'.

We truly appreciated the kindness and friendship offered to us by the people of this small community - including Wells. In spite of the trauma of those three weeks of evacuation they had made our stay one of enjoyment by offering us friendship, laughter and support.

On returning to Williams Lake I found my home was unscarred, the garden had bravely carried on without me, and my sister was finally able to fly back to her home - just three weeks later than originally planned. We were - and are - amongst the lucky ones.

It was a summer we will never forget with Williams Lake surrounded on all sides by fire. Some of our dancers who attended the Cloverdale Festival faced highway closures and were not able to return home by their usual direct routes. Many of us left Williams Lake early due to the proximity of fires to residences, and the thick smoke. It was hard to believe when the entire city of Williams Lake and surrounding areas were evacuated on July 15th. Most of our club members were fortunate to have relatives or friends to stay with in Prince George, Kamloops area, Okanagan and the Coast. Some of our club members were evacuated from their homes for a full month.

Williams Lake residents are so thankful to the host cities who went above and beyond in offering services to evacuees and their animals. Numerous friendly volunteers worked long hours cooking meals and processing various ESS forms, and also walking and feeding dogs and horses. Host cities also offered significant discounts to

evacuees at local stores and restaurants, and free admission to city facilities. Some Prince George dancers graciously offered their homes and properties to evacuated Whirlaway dancers.

When the smoke finally cleared, **Nick and Mary Anne** hosted a potluck barbecue on August 31st. The weather cooperated nicely and it was great to get together after the crazy summer and hear all the stories. The question of the evening was, "Where did you go for the evacuation?" Some of the guests stayed for a bit of square dancing afterwards. Nick even had some fire theme songs to dance to!

Congratulations to several of our dancers who returned from the 55+ Games in Vernon with medals: **Pat Harton** with four gold medals in track and field; and **Ellen Wieve and Madge Struthers** with a silver medal in floor curling.

The Whirlaways have enjoyed having Lac La Hache dancers **Kai and Irene Rasmussen** joining us on Thursday nights this fall.

Jerita and Terry also went to the **Williams Lake Jamboree** at the end of May. Sandi and Bob were in Victoria in April, down to the Fraser Valley for Sandi's brother-in-law's funeral, and then to Sunshine Valley and Chilliwack for 2 weeks in September.

Bits n' Pieces

The New Dancer Blues

Is your club finding it difficult to add new dancers to the membership? Is it discouraging? You are not alone. Below is a conversation that callers were having recently in a Facebook page that I follow.

CALLER # 1

Week five: What was supposed to be a group of 23 Basic dancers is suddenly 17. Two of the dancers who were going to repeat the Basic, decided to try Mainstream. One couple did not come back. One lady suddenly lost her husband, so we don't expect to see her back. And my one single man from last year who had planned to come back now has a new lady friend and has not decided what to do.... So, 17 dancers, one of which is a male. Fun times!!!!

CALLER # 2

I thought I had a challenge with 1 couple and 3 single ladies! How are you working with that?

CALLER # 1 I have several women dancing the man's part. Happens every year - that some women have to do that. Our club is 25% men and 75% women. This class will change those percentages!!!

CALLER # 3 It's pretty typical of what happens to us all. We get all excited about a new class and slowly over a few weeks, numbers drop off. The reasons are many and varied, but the result is usually the same. I've learned to be happy if I can keep half of what I start with. I am doing a lot of 2 couple teaches and we are learning how to rotate.
